I wanted to let NJH researchers know that Dr. Salem, Downey and the ORI have been working hard to create additional resources for our researchers during these trying times. The first effort we launched was to team up with our very talented Development team to generate some Discovery Accelerator Awards around COPD and Asthma research. We were able to generate donations of over 1 million dollars to fund faculty researchers from all NJH Departments. The second effort we have engaged in is with industry partnerships to leverage our biorepository that will generate data and resources to support our research cores and faculty. As these opportunities are finalized, I will provide more information and additional opportunities for our researchers to participate in.
