DENVER — Nearly 120 supporters raised almost \$200,000 on Aug. 7 and 8 to benefit chronically ill students at Kunsberg School on the campus of National Jewish Health during the National Jewish Health Kunsberg Classic. The two-day golf event was presented by RE/MAX LLC and sponsored by Shanahan's.

On Aug. 7, participants enjoyed a private dinner at Shanahan's steakhouse before hitting the links Aug. 8 at The Sanctuary.
